

Lending Our Hands to Help a Stricken City: Convention 2006 in New Orleans

Theta Delta Chi's 159th Convention was unlike any other. Post-Katrina, the Grand Lodge, Educational Foundation, and Founders' Corporation agreed to see it through and honor the commitment already made to take Minerva's annual festival to the Crescent City, devoting the day usually spent in educational sessions to work in the ravaged neighborhoods of the city.

'nder the direction of Peter Niche, Chi '77 (Rochester), and under the auspices of the Archdiocese of New Orleans' Helping Hands project, undergraduates and a respectable contingent of alumni toiled in New Orleans' humid August heat to clean up storm-wrecked houses and gardens in the Mid-City area.

Thanks to Bro. Niche's direction, the project was achieved without problems and the returning Good Samaritans reported a strenuous but rewarding day of useful labor. Hats off to all of them. See full story opposite.

Elections and Other Business

The serious business of a Convention usually falls into two categories: legislation and elections. This year there were no legislative proposals, rendering the business sessions comparatively brief. The Nominating Committee, however, chaired by Bro. Larry Sarchin, Xi Deuteron '77 (Washington), met for long hours interviewing candidates for the three Grand Lodge positions in play this year: Graduate Treasurer (a two-year position) and undergraduate Treasurer and Secretary (one year each).

Results are that former Charge Consultant Jerome Arnold, Xi Deuteron '00 (Washington), stood uncontested for the Graduate Treasurer position and joins the Grand Lodge until 2008. At the undergraduate level, 2005-06 Treasurer Andrew Welch, Epsilon '07 (William and Mary), achieved re-election in a contested election and Marc Tohme, Alpha '07 (Union) overcame opposition to win the position of Treasurer. Both will serve until Convention 2007.

PGL Bob LoParo, Alpha '87 (Union) and Graduate Secretary Adam McCready, Chi Deuteron '02 (George Washington), will complete the second year of the terms to which they were elected at the 2005 Convention.

The delegates also have the responsibility of choosing two oneyear (alumni) members of the Board of Directors of the Educational Foundation; these positions will be filled in 2006-07 by **Diego** McDonald, Chi Deuteron '00 (George Washington) and Scott Kniaz, Kappa '06 (Tufts). Diego served in this position the previous year and Scott has logged in several years of part-time work at the CFO in Boston.

The Entities

Convention is when the other two entities of the Fraternity, the Founders' Corporation and the Educational Foundation, meet to elect their own officers and directors. Long-time Founders' Corporation President Don Noveau, Beta '70 (Cornell) had announced his intention to step aside this year and in his place **Phil Curley**, Kappa Triton '76 (Northwestern), a Chicago lawyer and a serious golfer, now guides the fortunes of the entity that serves as a holding company to support the Grand Lodge.

Also new to the rank of the Governors of the Corporation is Jamie Phillips, Kappa Deuteron '91 (Illinois).

At the Educational Foundation's meeting, the resignation as Director by long-time member Marshall Baker, Theta Deuteron '49, was received with appreciation of his service and thanks for his continuing to serve on the Foundation's Investment Committee. Replacing him as a Director is **Adam Marks**, Nu Deuteron '99.

John "JB" Geisler, Gamma Triton '83 (Michigan State), continues to lead the Foundation as President.

Honors

The Awards distributed at the Grand Banquet were numerous and are summarized elsewhere in this issue. Outstanding among them, however, was the recognition of Boine T. Johnson, Iota Deuteron '53 and 45th PGL, as **Theta Delt of the Year**. Boine was instrumental as a Trustee of the Partridge Trust in transforming a modest legacy into an approximately \$1.4 million fortune, onehalf of which was destined to the Fraternity (the other to Williams College) and which is now the major part of the endowment of the Founders' Corporation.

Also noteworthy are the new *Philanthropy* and Service Awards, recognizing Charges that were outstanding in good works to others. **Theta Deuteron** (MIT), as has been the case for many years, walked away with the *Loyalty Cup*, and **Omicron Deuteron** (Dartmouth) with the *Victory Cup*.

Helping Hands in New Orleans

With the passing of the 159th Convention of our beloved fraternity, I wanted to take a moment to reflect on one of the most unique occurrences of the week for those who could not be in attendance. Saturday afternoon, every undergraduate, accom-

panied by staff, alumni and their wives took some time away from Bourbon Street to help the city get back on its feet after the Hurricane Katrina disaster.

Brother Peter Niche, Chi '77 (Rochester) graciously coordinated the day-long project in conjunction with Helping Hands Catholic Charities, a program which had gained momentum as one of the most successful agents of revitalization the New Orleans area. The program had taken over an abandoned diocese in one of

the most affected areas of the city for its headquarters. The fact that the church had been converted was a direct result of the hurricane, as nearly the entire congregation had been displaced. This was the first of many eye-opening truths that many of us would come to learn regarding the tragedy; I certainly had no idea how personally affected I would be until I actually found myself face to face with the devastation and its remnants.

We broke into groups of about a dozen or so volunteers after a thorough safety presentation from the group leaders. The type of work that would be done varied from site to site but generally followed the same sort of schedule. First, all of the personal possessions that could be saved were removed from the houses in order to be returned to their owners. Next, furniture, carpets, and any personal belongings beyond salvage were removed to be discarded. Many of our groups were involved in this step of the process. To see a home that had been waterlogged eight or ten feet high was so much more shocking than the news images to which many of us are accustomed. The watermarks on the walls are easily visible

> and drew numerous looks of amazement as students realized that the water had



been well over their heads.

The next step of the process involved removing all of the old ceilings, walls, and floorboards down to the studs

and removing every last bit of debris. This process was lengthy and dirty but was an absolute necessity before new drywall, carpets, and floors are installed. The construction part of the process would be completed by professionals but our team leaders told us almost all of the stripping process was done by volunteers like ourselves.

When my group arrived at our site, we had the opportunity to meet the elderly woman whose home we would be working to repair. Adding this face to the tragedy reminded us all that these were real people with real lives who had been uprooted by

an unforeseen occurrence. Moreover, our team leaders really tried to impart to us how important it was to treat their property with respect because for many of the elderly homeowners, their things and the memories associated with them were all they really had left.

The work itself gained momentum as we went along. Unsure of exactly what we were doing at first, we slowly gained confidence

> and purpose. Through the first hour, our efforts were unorganized and slow, but as the day progressed, our group, most of whom had met only days before, began to feel like a long seasoned work force. The teamwork and enthusiasm increased exponentially as we worked and when the end of our volunteer shift arrived, many of us remained with our team leader talking about future opportunities to help and hearing stories about his personal volunteer experiences.

> Overall the day was a rousing success and a unique experience that many of us had never had. To really see the devastation from Hurricane Katrina first hand gave it a texture and a reality that no news coverage did justice. In ad-

dition, including this event with our normal convention routine created a deep connection to the city that I had not experienced in past conventions. All in all I believe it was a rousing success and many thanks are due to the Theta Delta Chi Educational Foundation, Helping Hands Catholic Charities, Brother Peter Niche, all of the volunteers and the city of New Orleans for its hospitality.

Elected in 2005 for a two-year term expiring in 2007

Dear Brother Fitzgerald,

My first recollection of Norm was on his visitation to Epsilon in the spring of '41. It was homecoming week. VMI was to be our victim. By '42 we had vacated the house as the alumni didn't think, with the few of us left, we could manage it, so the college was kind to house us all in a section of Tyler Hall, when Norm visited. I think by then I was "Ad Hoc" President and Treasurer and Norm stayed at the Williamsburg Lodge and I would join him for dinner and we would "walk about" Williamsburg at night, memorable experience in those days, now a commercial extravagance! I recall we did visit one of the alumni to make a final plea to keep the house but they were going to turn it over to Brother Williams to run as an "Inn".

After the war I was stationed at NYC waiting to be discharged from the Navy and I visited Norm at the Central Office, and there was a problem locating Epsilon's charter, which I was sure I had sent him. And "surprise," he found it.

Now, Mac Diggs. After the war the family got into sailing and we belonged to the "Sodus Bay Yacht" club. One day I walked down on the dock, and met a young lady "hooking" a dragon on a rug for a beautiful Bermuda 30 ketch at the dock and the gentleman aboard had a face I recognized but couldn't place. She saw my predicament so she inquired if I might be a member of TDX, as I might have seen his picture on the cover of "The Shield" as the 39th President.

Then the family took up skiing and visited Holiday Valley quite regularly, just south of Olean where Mac and Nora, I think that was his wife's name, she was lovely, so they would invite us to stay overnight, and wine and dine us at their club The last contact with "Mac" was when TDX had its annual meeting in Williamsburg. I was then living in Florida, and sure enough "Mac" was there. I wrote him how sorry I was I didn't attend and he replied that Nora had passed away and he had traded his Bermuda 30 in for a Motor Home. And that pretty much covers my memory of the "Good Old Days."

My main memories of fraternity life at Dartmouth during the years of 1940-1943 are most pleasant. Our house was very fortunate in that we received from the father of Ollie Quale, Omi Deut '42, much new furniture after a Democratic convention. As a result our house was in very good condition compared with what I have seen in recent years. As house manager I saw to it that it was kept that way.

We enjoyed Saturday night parties with very good singing and in fact won the inter-fraternity "Hum" singing Brahms "Lullaby". Because of the war we had summers in Hanover and our house had a flat portion of roof where we had summer furniture and umbrellas. It was really nice up there.

At "Green Key" we had chaperones living in the house with our dates. WE in turn had to find a place to stay elsewhere. Because of gas rationing we stayed in Hanover most of the time and really got to know each other. After serving in the Marine Corps I again returned to Dartmouth to finish my graduate work at Tuck School. Once again I had many happy hours residing in the Theta Delta Chi house. Many of

Dear Mr. Fitzgerald,

I was recruited into the Chi Charge as a freshman at the University of Rochester in 1940. That's 65+ years ago, wow! And this must be said about that. During all these years since, and I've been professionally all over the world, that acceptance has always been a matter of pride to me. I'm a fraternity man: a Theta Delt.

But of course campus life was different in the 1940's. There were no coed dorms, and the women's dorms were strictly off limits to men. Very few students had cars-you really stood out if you had a car, instant popularity. However our public transportation was good. Fraternities competed with each other as they no doubt still do: in the Fall, swimming laps in the pool at the gym: every evening freshmen reported so many laps before supper, 20 (not good), 40 (good), 50 or better got a brief nod of approval. We had one fellow freshman, Gordon Morrison, who was a free-style champion in high school in Chicago—100 laps no sweat for him, so that helped against our principal athletic rivals, the Psi Upsilon; also in baseball and basketball.

There was scholarship rivalry too. We had two Phi Beta Kappas in the senior class, several coming along, and my own class of 1944 had two Phi Betes, Bill Baum and Charlie Bergerson. If you grades slipped a little, or weren't good to begin with, you heard about it from an upperclassman, and you kept hearing about it. The Alpha Beta Phi's were our chief scholarship rivals-usually a little better, actually.

Time passes, standards gradually change; people look at things in a different way now in 2006 than then in 1940 and in 1943, when I left the Theta Delt house where I lived, to begin Aviation Cadet training in the Arm Air Forces. But I think we were better off then. We had firm supervision of the underclassmen by the upperclassmen. There were rules. No liquor in the House. No women on the second floor. Drugs weren't an issue then; drinking and drunks just weren't treated, although going to the bars on Saturday night was O.K. Regarding the "recreational drugs", I can say definitely that had we learned that one of our Theta Delts used drugs, he would have been regarded with "fear and loathing". Was all this old-fashioned, too tough, unenforceable? Not then. Was it good? I think so

LETTER from the Field

Inter-fraternity Council Executive Board Member and runner-up for Mr. Fraternity 2005. Not too shabby for a wayward freshman who was thinking about dropping out of school until the brothers of the fraternity he had decided to join gave him a reason to stick around (and made him attend classes).

I still think back to when my big brother in the Fraternity asked me to promise him I would graduate when I am working on my thesis as it will be the last thing I need to do to fulfill that six year old promise. I'm sure it is apparent how important Theta Delta Chi has become to me, just as I'm sure it is important to all of you. The decision to join became a pivotal moment in my life and this was one of the biggest reasons I decided to dedicate a couple years of my life to serving the Old Lady as a Charge Consultant.

I left Boston the third week in August for a three month road trip. While about six weeks will be spent working to re-colonize Epsilon Triton at Arizona State, I will work with about eight different charges before returning home. miles meander from Boston to Tempe making numerous stops along the way. Eventually after about four days of driving we arrived in Tempe where Lambda Deuteron's Jacob Dababneh graciously opened his home to us.

On August 29th, I flew from Phoenix to Madison, Wisconsin to help the Sigma Deuteron brothers plan how to make their Charge the strongest it could be. After two weeks of successful recruitment events. thoughtful action planning and the sort of impromptu Charge improvement conversation that could only occur between brothers, I found myself on my last day there watching the Wisconsin-Western Illinois game with Brian Larsen, Aaron Munson, and Alex Zaslasky

realizing that I felt like I was at home with my Sigma Triton brothers even though I was five states away with the Sigma Deuts.

It's an amazing feeling that I've had in these last few weeks. In a country that used to seem endless to a lifetime east-coaster, things have felt a little bit smaller, and the brotherhood a little bit closer. The more guys I meet, the easier is it to see what brings us all together each year at convention, that intangible quality that makes us each Theta Delts.

In recruiting the new Epsilon Triton brethren, I find myself exciting to find them. There are Theta Delts everywhere, those individuals who reflect our values, who enrich our lives, and who benefit our organizations; we just need to find them. I have so much faith that Theta Delta Chi will continue its upward ascension as one of North America's greatest fraternities because everyday I meet a new Theta Delt who reminds me that brotherhood knows no bounds. Penn State and my memories there will always be special

to me, but now more than ever I realize that the saying, "Not four years, for life" truly embodies what it means to be part of our fraternity.


The festivities were by no means over, as the brothers found their way, some more easily than
