CHARGE SPOTLIGHT





Nu Charge in Theta Delta Chi is one of the oldest fraternities at the University of Virginia. The Charge was originally established in 1857, just a scant ten (10) years after the founding of the Fraternity at Union College. Unfortunately, it closed in 1859 and the records were lost during the Civil War. In 1873 the Charge was revived and was subsequently closed in 1881. They rose again in 1910 and have continuously existed since then. They have also resided in the same location for over 100 years. The Charge house was designed to match the original Jeffersonian architecture of the grounds with large columns and red brick construction. The Alumni have undertaken an extensive renovation of the house focusing first on the façade and now moving into the interior spaces.

While the Charge is relatively small at only 36 members, with a target of growing to 50 in the near future, they are particularly proud of the number of service hours they have amassed recently placing them in the top tier of all fraternities at UVA. They are currently planning a fund-raiser for the Flutie Foundation having previously participated in one for the Virginia Institute of Autism.

The Brothers have cultivated a very positive reputation as being a safe place for people to come to and have developed a very strong and close brotherhood. They tell a story about a brother who works as a bus driver for the UVA transportation department. This brother will work late night shifts and occasionally misses social gatherings at the Charge house. It is not uncommon that when this happens, and these gatherings wind

down and end, the brothers will go to a nearby bus stop and wait for his bus to arrive, they board it with speakers and proceed to make sure he can at least enjoy the music of the event he missed.

They also found the depth of the bonds of brotherhood recently when a shooting occurred on the grounds. The Charge was in a meeting in the house conducting their November elections when the shooting began. They all retreated to the basement of the house to shelter in place. During the many hours they spent together, they provided aid and comfort to each other during this dark time in their lives. They lived the words of our founders of "a confiding friendship founded on mutual esteem and dependence."

The Charge has determined to increase its membership. Recruitment can only happen during the Spring term. However, the Charge is implementing 365-day recruitment strategies and working to maintain its positive reputation at the University of Virginia. They are also participating in self-funded renovations to their house to mirror those of the alumni association. The Charge looks forward to life in their Charge house for another 100 years.

Raymond M. Hood, Zeta 1902 (Brown)

If you have ever visited Chicago and walked past the <u>Tribune Tower</u> on Michigan Avenue, or visited New York City and toured <u>Rockefeller Center</u>, the <u>Daily News Building</u>, or the <u>American Radiator Building</u>, you have seen the work of <u>architect</u> and Theta Delt Raymond Hood, Zeta 1902 (Brown).

Raymond Hood originally enrolled at Brown University where he was initiated into Theta Delta Chi, and later transferred to the MIT School of Architecture before eventually graduating from the Ecole des Beaux-Arts (Paris) in 1911.

As a person, Bro. Hood was deemed to be short in stature, as an American architect he was a towering giant. His mark on the Manhattan skyline is prodigious. He proposed a radical approach to the land-starved congestion of Manhattan by being an early champion of the concept of a "city of towers." According to ArchDaily an Architectural News website: "Hood's first project in New York, the American Radiator Building, was lauded for its use of black brick and its gold-dipped finial. By reducing the size of the building on the lot so it did not abut another buildable site, Hood was able to add more windows to his tower and improve the quality of office space within. The black brick solved the issue of the facade being interrupted by the outlines of windows and the gold accent of the building's apex was a form of architectural advertising without images or slogans." As they further stated, "though he was fond of flourishes, beginning with Gothicism and graduating to Art Deco, Hood's pragmatism made him the ideal choice for metropolitan projects that sought to redefine the scale of civic and corporate architecture in the twentieth century."

Bro. Hood serves as a model for all of us as his work stands the test of time for the improvement of urban architecture, one of the creators of the American Skyscraper and a reimagining of what cities can be.
